- 3. This however did not deter parties from continuing to disparage my reputation and force my wife and I to conceal our identities.
- 4. My wife, owned her own business in Seattle, one that predated our marriage. In the onslaught of publication of my information, bad actors used my information to locate my residence and made it public on internet platforms.
- 5. We made attempts to privatize online information to no avail.
- 6. My wife and her business were located using my name and information along with public state records. The onslaught that followed were threats made directly to her via business and social platforms. She was told that I was a "racist" "murderer", that she was a racist and had blood on her hands. They told her that she should just shoot herself in the head and that they would never stop pursuing her. Personal photos of her were pilfered and published to spread awareness of her name and image.
- 7. A competitor, contacted distributors and others in her business to disparage and incite others to act against her. She received a call from a concerned party in the Midwest, whom we had never met, telling her they had received word from industry people about her relationship with me and the desire to banish her from the profession.
- 8. Rioters coordinated an attack on the boarded up store in Seattle, that they during CHOP, had emblazoned "Killer Cop" across the storefront. They burglarized valuables, and set fire to merchandise in the street. They continued even after to publicize their actions and our information.
- 9. My wife, needless to say, suffered extreme emotional distress or detrimental financial consequences.
- 10. While I was relatively secure in my profession, I was withheld from uniform service by my department for fear of recognition. Indeed, I cannot even be a patrol officer in Seattle, Washington a job I loved because of safety and fear of recognition. It is simply too dangerous. Personally, my reputation and mental health were greatly affected by this entire incident.
- 11. Information released to the public has profound effects on the lives of not only involved officers but family members as well. To this day we still have very real concerns for the safety and wellbeing of our family.

b. Several times I was asked if my wife still worked as a teacher at a specific school and they were going to visit and assault her at work.
c. On a regular basis my home address was mentioned with threats to "go to my house and rape my wife" "kill my family". At times they stated they knew I was at work dealing with protests so they were going to go assault/rape my wife since I was otherwise preoccupied dealing with demonstrators.
d. I received a phone call on my personal cell that referred to me as "Office Jamison Maehler" the person on the phone call then proceeded to say they were going to kill me and my family for being a police officer. The person named my home address and wife in the call.
3. Needless to say, I did not share <i>any</i> information with any members of the crowd, none of whom I knew. I can only assume that somebody had researched my name and uncovered all this information about me and my family starting with my address and taking it from there. I have no idea how they would get some of this information except through both online searching and/or driving by my house.
4. These threats were hateful, harassing threatening, and highly offensive (to say the least).
5. I live every day with the thought that one of these individuals, or groups or individuals, could carry out their harassing threats upon me and my family. understand being a police officer is stressful and dangerous on duty—but my persona life and family must be strictly off limits.
6. My experience is not unique, but in my conversations, many other police officers have had their personal information thrown in their face as a means to harass, intimidate and threaten police officers that they are not safe on, or off, the job.



As the President of the Guild, it is my job to support and advocate for the well-being of our Guild members. This includes, just by way of example, contract negotiations, setting up and administering programs for our Members, advocating for improving economic and working conditions, and creating an organization which supports and benefits its Members.

- 4. As the President of the Guild, one of my foremost concerns is that our Members are able serve Seattle, and its residents, effectively, professionally, loyally, safely and with pride. In turn, the Membership expects me to advocate for these concerns. In order to do so, I speak to many Members every day, all day, and have for 2 years, on a myriad of issues affecting our Member's professional lives, including as their professional lives may affect their personal lives.
- 9
 5. No one denies that the job of a Police Officer in a major metropolitan area like Seattle, can be a stressful and dangerous while on duty. Each of our Members knowingly accepts the stress and danger of as part of the public service of being a Police Officer. It is part of the *on-duty* job of patrolling streets, encountering volatile situations with imperfect information, and responding to emergency situations.
- 12
 6. Nevertheless, despite the stress and danger that comes with this on-duty job, as the President of the Guild, it is imperative for my Members, that when I can reasonably make their already difficult and dangerous job less stressful and less dangerous, I speak out. I do so here to respectfully educate the Court as to what is exactly at stake here.
- Our Members bravely and voluntarily put on their uniforms every day in public service to Seattle. However, *when they take off that uniform,* they want, and deserve, to have, and live, a lawful private life. They are not politicians, who publicly campaigned to get elected. They are, respectfully, public servants entitled to have a lawful private life just like the tens of thousands of Seattle's (and King County's) other government workers like bus drivers, city engineers, and, respectfully, your very own Court staff.

 8. If they have *done nothing wrong*, like these four officers, who were thoroughly investigated by the Office of Police Accountability about their off duty private lives, *have proven is the case*, Members do not deserve to have their names and private lives splashed across social media, blogs, and published in the Seattle Times simply because certain individuals unilaterally believe that they have the "right" to "expose" the private off duty activities of police officers.

1	9. The effect of this unwanted exposure is clear and will cause a familiar pattern to reoccur.

4	10. Unfortunately, this is the modus operand of certain groups like Defund SPD—which make

6	11. I will first speak about my own experiences:

14	The Court should know that it was not just my family, but the entire neighborhood that was effected. Several neighbors approached me concerned for their well being and the safety of their property.

16	 c. My name is placed on all sundry of flyers and graffiti distributed throughout Seattle. In fact, there is graffiti calling for me to be "killed." I attach just a few examples. <u>Exhibit C</u>

18	12. My role as the head of the Union does not necessarily make me any more of a target than anyone else. Unfortunately, the blurring between public and private lives, is a common				
19	tactic to harass individuals. Indeed, former Police Chief Carmen Best suffered the same type of offline private harassment as I did. I attach various articles. Exhibit D Again, I				
20	would point out that the Lynnwood Times reported that it was not only Chief Best that				
21	suffered, but her neighbors were targeted as well—just as my neighbors voiced their concern.

13. When there is a high profile case, rank and file Officers, fare no better in protecting their personal safety and private lives. Indeed, *anytime there is a high profile case*, like the one at bar, there are individuals who believe they can take "justice" into their own hands and harass officers without any concern of what could happen. I discuss just some examples below:

- a. Detective Steve McNew, who was involved in the fatal shooting of Charlena Lyles, and was cleared of any misconduct after a lengthy investigation, was specifically targeted by protesters. Detective McNew owns a store with his wife which was set afire in an arson. <u>Exhibit E</u> In fact, Detective McNew's professional life was so upended, he can no longer serve as a patrol officer any more.
- b. Officer Jared Campbell was *misidentified and wrongly named* as an officer who pepper sprayed a child during a protest. Regardless of Officer Campbell being wrongly named, he was shamed all over the internet, including a petition hundreds of thousand of signatures circulating and demanding he be fired. Exhibit F His professional reputation was ruined—even though he did not have anything to do with the incident in question. Even worse, his personal address and phone number were exposed to the public. The situation became so bad that he voluntarily left Seattle Police Department and his family left the Seattle area.
- c. Officer Dan Auderer has had people yell the names of his daughters at him, tell him where they go to school, and say all sundry of horrific things about what they would do to his daughters. In fact, they know so much about him that they yelled at him about his electric car and riding a lawnmower. This leads me to believe that they found his home address and have stalked him there.
 - d. Officer Mahler had potential suspects yell his home address at him during the line of duty and tell him that they were going to "rape [his] wife" and "kill [his] family." They called his personal phone number and named his wife on the call.
- 18
 14. Second, as mentioned, once an Officer is identified as one which a segment of the "internet community" unilaterally deems unacceptable to serve the City of Seattle, their *professional lives* are made that much more dangerous.
 - a. For example: If an Officer is engaging a hostile crowd and somebody yells out the name of their spouse or daughter—any Police Officer, indeed any human being, would be distracted and even the most professional of Police Officer could have their judgment affected. By threatening a family member, by name, it interjects a level of emotional threat beyond belligerent taunting. Moreover, and indeed, these types of insults have the ability to embolden a hostile crowd. When people who

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wish to do you harm yell out your wife or children's names, it can easily cause a crowd to then feel emboldened as if "anything goes" and, quickly, situations can get out of hand as a hostile crowd grows even more brazen.

15. Unfortunately, for the Doe Officers, this case has all the same factors as the cases and instances above—this is a high profile case covered by the Seattle Times (and nationally), there are vigilant litigators and national organizations who are engaging in litigation solely to "get the names" of the Doe Officers, and these Officers are falsely being labeled "racists" and "white supremacists."

6
16. I do not know why these groups are so determined to "get the names." However, it only makes these Officers, and myself representing the general Membership, *even more alarmed* because we do not understand what will happen with the names if they were to be released. There could only be one reason for demanding these names which is to subject these individuals to hatred, ridicule, threats, harassment, or reprisals. If it is anything like the examples above, this hatred, ridicule, threats, harassment, or reprisal could carry over for these Officers' safety in the line of duty and their ability, and their and their families' ability, to hold a private life secure in their safety.

Finally, and respectfully, this Court must understand that this case also goes beyond these Officers. The ability of the internet to publicize Officers' identities so that then self-appointed individuals can unilaterally determine who, when and how to harass and threaten them, and purposefully endanger them in the line of duty, is of grave concern to *every* Seattle Police Officer—as it happens far too often. The fact that this does occur, and the threat it will occur yet again here, where those out to "get" certain Officers names will "get" Officers names and do something untoward with it is an unsettling threat to <u>all</u> Seattle Police Officers.

18. Seattle Police Officers' morale is at a low that I have not seen in my 22 years and, accordingly, we are suffering a municipal crisis in our inability to stop the attrition from the Seattle Police Department or, systemically even worse, the ability to even find people who would be willing to serve in Seattle Police Department. The idea that an Officer's *lawful private life* should be exposed—across the Seattle Times and all sundry of social media—to needlessly subject them to online harassment, threats to their family and increase their danger on the job will certainly further dishearten and dismay Seattle's Police Officers.

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- Police Chief Carmen Best: A throng of protesters showed up outside her homein unincorporated Snohomish County earlier this month, angering neighbors who were unsettled by the protests outside their front porches.
- Council President Lorena Gonzales. Protesters went to her West Seattle homein July just hours after she had pleaded with demonstrators to dial back their protests at the homes of city leaders.
- Councilwoman Debra Juarez. About 50 protesters marched to her North Seattle home last month and chanted "Black Lives Matter" and "Defund police" for about an hour, her neighbors said at the time.
- Councilman Alex Pedersen. Before they targeted Juarez's home, protesters rallied in front of Pedersen Seattle home, leaving notes on his home and painting the street with slogans. He told KOMO News later that he ended up sending his family away to live somewhere else for awhile because of the unrest.
- Councilwoman Tammy Morales. Protesters also went to her home in July. "There was maybe 100 people in the street in front of my home and I appreciated the opportunity to listen to what they had to say," Morales said that month. "I realize my experience was different from others."

Protesters showed up at a home they apparently believed was Solan's house around 10:30 p.m. They were banging on a drum and chanting about not sleeping.



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Last night in Seattle a group of protesters spent the evening standing outside of the home Mike Solan, the president of the Seattle Police Officers Guild. There have been similar occurrences outside the homes of former Seattle Police Chief Carmen Best and Mayor Jenny Durkan. Solan joined the Dori Monson Show to discuss what happened and how Seattle politicians are allowing this.



"Well, it's clear that these people are desperate and as a person who dedicated my life to serve other human beings who are in need of help, when I see the mob behavior visit my doorstep, what it does for me and my family is it just emboldens us to continue to push back against that nonsensical activism," he said.

"Frankly, it will never stop me ever. And I think if more people have that mindset and have the courage to stand up, we can win ... As a husband as a father, obviously I will defend my family's security until I can't anymore."

Seattle business broken into three times during opening weekend

Solan says he is prepared to defend himself should the mob take things even further at his property.

"If these mob individuals bring a fight to my doorstep, they better be prepared for a significant response," he said.

"Meaning what?" Dori asked.

"I think your listenership understands what I'm referring to, that if they approach my property with intent to breach my property line, with an intent to conduct criminal activity, to hurt my family, it's a different ball game here," Solan said.



Solan believes that if Seattle leaders and officials took a harder stance against this type of activity, the groups would be less emboldened in doing so, and that their silence on it is all politics.

"This is happening because our feckless leaders aren't doing anything to denounce this publicly. I firmly believe that if they put forth a strong message publicly to condemn these criminal actions, this would die down. But of course they won't. Because this is all about politics," he said.

"The job of policing, the profession that it is, the history behind this profession – we're being used for political purposes for the November election. We're pawns in this struggle. And this energy by the far left radical parts of our society are using police as that pawn to divide our nation based upon false narratives ... This mob behavior, this intimidated mob justice ideology that is dividing our country more than uniting us, backed by our feckless politicians, only emboldens me to continue to push back because we're in a struggle for America right now, we're on a razor's edge."


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

9;50 PM: If he's home, he hasn't come out to speak with the group (in their previous WS marches, they have talked to three city councilmembers - two of them twice and the county executive).

9:55 PM: The group has left, headed back toward The Junction.

This is a civil infraction and can carry a fine up to \$50.

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




Resolution Calling for the Resignation of Mike Solan, Seattle Police Officers Guild (SPOG) President

Protesters say they were met with guns at Seattle Police Chief Carmen Best's home

Seattle Police Chief Carmen Best wrote a letter to city council after a group of protesters went to her Snohomish County residence.

SEATTLE — Seattle Police Chief Carmen Best said a "large group of aggressive protestors" targeted her house late Saturday night in Snohomish County.

In a letter to Seattle City Council, Best said her neighbors were concerned by the group, but "they were successful in ensuring the crowd was not able to trespass or engage in other illegal behavior in the area, despite repeated attempts to do so."

Best urged the city council to "stand up for what is right" and asked council members to call for an end to these tactics used to target elected officials and civil servants.

Best said the actions are "out of line with and go against every democratic principle that guides our nation." Click here to read Best's full letter to Seattle City Council.

Protesters that were there that night said they are disappointed in Best's letter. They said they disagree that they were aggressive, and instead, said the aggressors were the neighbors Best praised.

"All we were doing was walking and they met us with guns, I don't know who the aggressor is at that point, but I don't think it's us," said Nicole Gitaka, a demonstrator with "Every Day March."

Gitaka and her fellow protesters said less than 100 people went to the Snohomish County neighborhood and that they did not go there to destroy or cause trouble -- they wanted to ask the chief some questions regarding the Black Lives Matter movement in Seattle and the police departments use of crowd control measures.

The group said they were met by Best's neighbors who blocked the road and displayed guns. They said they attempted to talk to the neighbors, explain what they were doing there and get them to move out of the road but they reportedly refused. The protesters ended up leaving the neighborhood when they felt unsafe. "Nobody from us approached that situation with aggression, nobody went there like were going to mess up the neighborhood," said Gitaka. "Our main objective, the only thing we're going to do was march down to Chief Best's house, make some noise, ask some questions, and go, that's what was going to happen."

For the most part, council members did not publicly respond to Best's request, except Seattle City Councilmember Tammy Morales who objected to Best's neighbors confronting the protesters.

"I take exception to the response by our police chief who celebrated that her neighbors met with these young people with guns," said Morales.

Protesting at leaders' homes has been happening for years, but the protests have grown in recent months, in the wake of the national protests of the killing of George Floyd by police officers in Minneapolis and amid the calls in Seattle to drastically cut the police budget and reinvest those resources into other services.



Last week, local tribes denounced the continued protests at the home of Councilmember Debora Juarez, who is one of the two councilmembers who did not commit to a 50% defunding of police.

Juarez, who is a member of the Blackfeet tribe, is the only Native American councilmember.

In June, Seattle City Councilmember Kshama Sawant joined a large group of protesters outside the now-disbanded "Capitol Hill Organized Protest" zone before leading a march to Mayor Jenny Durkan's home.

In a statement, Snohomish County Sheriff Adam Fortney said he was notified of a group of about 200 protesters at Best's residence in unincorporated Snohomish County around 8:30 p.m. Saturday. He said he spoke with Best on the phone, who was not home at the time.

"I assured [Best] that the Snohomish County Sheriff's Office would deploy whatever resources were necessary to protect her, her family, and her property," Fortney said in the statement. "I am pleased to report this group decided to disperse and there were no other incidents [Saturday night].

Fortney added that the Snohomish County Sheriff's Office has been "supportive and accommodating" to all peaceful demonstrations, but said protesters targeting an individual's home is a "bullying tactic."

"If this group or any other group wants to protest the government, we would ask they do so at a government building and not at any individual's private residence," he wrote.

This is not the first time protesters targeted the homes of law enforcement or elected officials.

A Puyallup Police Department officer recently found a derogatory message written in chalk in front of his home. Puyallup Police Chief Scott Engle posted a message on Facebook defending the officer, describing him as a U.S. Army veteran, husband, father, and an officer who wants to serve and protect.

Engle went on to say the police and community need each other, adding, "We are all in this together."

As the Seattle City Council sifts through dozens of piecemeal #defundSPD proposals this week, District 3's Kshama Sawant has been dealt several early blows in the debate while an activist strategy of targeting the homes of public officials caused a stir Saturday as demonstrators tried to bring their message to SPD Chief Carmen Best's neighborhood in a "quaint residential community in unincorporated Snohomish County."

Here's how the Lynnwood Times described the Saturday night scene:

A crowd of about 200 persons, mostly white men and women in their twenties, were dressed in black with masks and black hoods and carried signs that read "Black Lives Matter." Black Lives Matter protestors shouted profanity and insults at neighbors, took license plate information on vehicles, took pictures of homes, and asked little kids who lived in the neighborhood what schools they attended.

The arrival of Black Lives Matter on Best's rural Snohomish County home turf comes as the summer's debate over how much and how quickly to defund the Seattle Police Department is coming to a head.

"These direct actions against elected officials, and especially civil servants like myself, are out of line with and go against every democratic principle that guides our nation," Chief Best wrote in a public letter calling on the city council to denounce the protest strategy. "Before this devolves into the new way of doing business by mob rule here in Seattle, and across the nation, elected officials like you must forcefully call for the end of these tactics."

The demonstration has been part of several Black Lives Matter and #defundSPD actions in recent weeks targeting the home of public officials including one this weekend at the home of budget chair Teresa Mosqueda.

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In late June, Sawant marched with hundreds and held a #defundSPD rally in front of Durkan's Northeast Seattle home setting off a new front in her ongoing war with the mayor. Council president M. Lorena González said she would not pursue Durkan's demands that Sawant be investigated over the protest.

The Black Lives Matter movement has deployed the strategy before. In 2016, CHS reported on an August BLM demonstration making a long stop outside then-Mayor Ed Murray's North Capitol Hill home. Activists opposing construction of a new youth jail returned to the street for another demonstration in December of that year.

Meanwhile, small protests against SPD violence and inequity have continued on Capitol Hill with the "Everyday Protest March" meeting nightly outside the boarded-up Capitol Hill Presbyterian Church on Harvard Ave to march for Black Lives Matter causes.

The Decriminalize Seattle group and the King County Equity Now Coalition unveiled a four-point plan that activists say would best reallocate money currently spent on patrol officers for community needs including major changes to how Seattle's 911 system works and social initiatives including housing.

Monday, the city council's budget committee was finishing its run-through of dozens of proposed line item cuts and changes to the department that need to be in place by next Monday, August 10th's final vote on rebalancing the city's 2020 budget.

Last week, CHS reported on Sawant's step forward as the only city council member to present proposals that would achieve the demands of protesters and community groups for a 50% cut to SPD starting immediately with the remaining 2020 budget.

While a majority of the council has said they support the long-term goal of cutting the department's annual \$409 million budget by 50%, their proposals being presented and considered this week would not come anywhere close to an immediate halving.

Sawan'ts proposals would require massive and immediate layoffs for SPD. Monday, the council heard from City Hall staff who said that SPD's 2020 depletion of funds on overtime and protest service leaves the department with a remaining budget dedicated primarily to salaries. That spend down combined with current labor agreements create what is ostensibly a three-month window to achieve any savings: To save \$3 million this year, the city would have to provide immediate layoff notices to nearly 200 officers starting this weekend.

To reach Sawant's \$86 million goal in the remaining months of 2020, you would have to send a notice to every sworn officer right away, one staffer told the budget committee Monday.

While the positioning make it even more unlikely that Sawant's proposals will attract support from her fellow council members, the council did seem likely to find line items for immediate cuts including reduction in SWAT spending and cuts to the Navigation Team responsible for sweeping encampments.

Mayor Durkan, meanwhile, has focused on a plan for \$76 million in cuts to SPD in 2021 — about a third of the #defundSPD 50% goal. Durkan said the plan would call for \$56 million of that cut coming from moving the 911 call center out of SPD as well as moving parking enforcement to the Seattle Department of Transportation.



After protests near her home, Seattle police chief asks City Council to intervene; activists say neighbors pointed guns at them

A debate unfolded online Sunday night over whether protests against police brutality should include visits to public officials' homes — and whether such a discussion distracts from the fight for Black lives — after Seattle police Chief Carmen Best implored the City Council to "forcefully call for the end of these tactics."

Best wrote a letter to the council Sunday after protesters showed up outside her Snohomish County home Saturday night, the latest in a series of visits the demonstrations have paid to those who hold public power in Seattle, including City Council members and Mayor Jenny Durkan.

Residents blocked a road into Best's neighborhood with a truck, according to the letter and posts on social media from that evening. Protesters told KING-TV they stayed on the road and never stepped foot on anyone's property.

Multiple posts that appeared to come from Best's neighbors referred to protesters as "terrorists," and at least one included a photo of a gun. Protesters told KING-TV some neighbors pointed guns at them.

"Understand that white vigilantes and police are two sides of the same coin when it comes to state sanctioned violence against Black peoples," read a tweet Sunday night from attorney, activist and former Seattle mayoral candidate Nikkita Oliver.

Best's letter said her neighbors "were concerned by such a large group" and didn't allow protesters to "trespass or engage in other illegal behavior in the area, despite repeated attempts to do so." She didn't elaborate on the behavior in question but wrote that the Snohomish County sheriff was "monitoring the situation."

Snohomish County Sheriff Adam Fortney said most of the protesters were dispersing or had already left when deputies arrived. He said he spoke with Best, who was not at home at the time, on the phone and "assured her that the Snohomish County Sheriff's Office would deploy whatever resources were necessary to protect her, her family and her property."

"The Snohomish County Sheriff's Office has been supportive and accommodating to all peaceful protests that have occurred in our jurisdiction," Fortney said in a statement. "With that said, protesters targeting one individual's house is a bullying tactic that will certainly require an extra patrol response to ensure every resident in Snohomish County can feel safe in their own home, with their loved ones, no matter what they choose to do to make a living."

Earlier this year in Snohomish County, hundreds gathered with assault rifles, handguns and other firearms after rumors spread about Antifa activists planning to bring chaos to the community. Predictions of violence never materialized. False claims of Antifa protesters wreaking havoc on small cities have also hit other areas of the country in the wake of unrest over the police killing of George Floyd, spreading fear in already tense communities.

Activists and some journalists disputed accusations of violence during Saturday's events and pointed out that gathering outside politicians' homes has long been a way demonstrators call attention to causes.

"Clearly, emailing and calling them is not working, because they don't respond, they don't even reach back out. But the second you show up to their house, they want to come out and talk," one protester from the group Everyday March told

KING-TV this week in an interview that was also live-streamed on the @seattleeveningmarch Instagram page. "And then, all of a sudden, we're 'intimidating,' we're 'bullying' - no. It's because you guys are ignoring the constituents that put you in those offices. Period."

Seattle protesters have recently marched through other city officials' neighborhoods: Last week, the nightly march made its way to City Council President Lorena González's home in West Seattle and Councilmember Andrew Lewis' residence in Queen Anne. Both stepped outside to talk to the protesters and voice their support for the movement.

In late June, hundreds of people marched from Warren G. Magnuson Park to Mayor Jenny Durkan's home. That march prompted the mayor to ask the City Council to investigate Councilmember Kshama Sawant, who took part in the June demonstration. Because Durkan's address hasn't been publicly disclosed due to her background as a former U.S. attorney, she said the march was organized with a "reckless disregard of the safety of (her) family and children."

González later said she wouldn't fulfill Durkan's request, maintaining that she wanted the council to instead concentrate on other work — including the coronavirus pandemic, economic crisis and civil rights movement currently unfolding — that demands their attention.

A group of four protesters interviewed on KING-TV said they were disappointed by the letter from Best, who is Black, because Seattle's Black community had supported her becoming the police chief.

Best's letter on Sunday also had some questioning the wisdom and efficacy of asking the Seattle City Council to tell demonstrators where they can and cannot protest.

Each side accused the other of distracting the public from issues at the heart of recent protests: social justice, an end to systemic racism and police brutality, and defunding police to direct money toward other community needs.

"The events of this summer were initiated in a moment of grief and outrage over the murder of George Floyd by Minneapolis police officers and so many other Black and Brown people suffering at the hands of injustice," Best wrote. "All of us must ensure that this righteous cause is not lost in the confusion of so many protestors now engaging in violence and intimidation, which many are not speaking against."

Robert Cruickshank, campaign director for activist group Demand Progress, tweeted that Best's letter was meant to direct attention away from Seattle police's own actions — "a classic 'change the conversation' game ahead of this week's #DefundSPD vote."

Seattle City Council members on Friday unveiled a plan to shrink the Police Department, starting with a spate of budget proposals that could reduce the force by as many as 100 officers through layoffs and attrition this year.

Most of the proposals, including cuts aimed at the department's SWAT team, encampment-removal team and mounted unit, appear to have enough support to pass. Those moves and an accompanying resolution, stating the council's intent to make more dramatic changes in next year's budget and to create a new Department of Community Safety, could pave the way for sweeping changes in response to the Black Lives Matter protests that have surged throughout the city and across the nation.

Yet the package won't immediately accomplish what many protesters have been calling for, and what police Chief Carmen Best has issued warnings about: reducing the Police Department's spending by at least 50% and redirecting that money to other priorities.

Although Best has said she supports moving certain police duties to community-based models, she's voiced concerns that cutting the Police Department's budget by 50% could bring "catastrophic" consequences, including mass layoffs and the closure of the Southwest Precinct.

At a socially distanced conversation in a Central District park between officers and residents last month, police Assistant Chief Eric Greening also said slashing the budget would mean many youth and community programs would be the first to go.

The council's budget committee may vote on the matter Wednesday.



Protesters went to meet with Chief Best at her home. But then her neighbors emerged

Down a dead-end road in rural Snohomish County, where American flags fly, a group of young protesters, led by Black women, drove in.

This was not a typical route for these protesters, who call themselves the Everyday March. This group more often parades down city streets where Seattle politicians live, to engage them in discussion.

But Carmen Best, the Seattle police chief, and the next stop on their tour, lives out here, an hour north of Seattle.

Best is a woman of seeming contradictions: She says she wants radical change but opposes defunding the police; she is a Black woman who calls the death of George Floyd a murder, but who also allows her officers to spray demonstrators with tear gas and rubber bullets.

On Saturday night, the Everyday Marchers wanted to discuss defunding the police, one of their five goals.

Best was not home when the protesters arrived in Snohomish, but her neighbors were, and took immediate notice of these outsiders.

They quickly barricaded the road with trucks. Some pulled out guns.

The incident drew national media attention after a Lynnwood newspaper wrote that hundreds of protesters "stormed" Best's neighborhood. But video footage, and accounts from protesters, suggest a less exciting visit.

Cell phone video of one confrontation shows two protesters with their hands up, walking away from a black Escalade blocking the road. A man carrying what appeared to be an AR-15 follows behind them.

"We are here to peacefully assemble," a man announces loudly on the video.

"Nope," says the man with the rifle. "Peacefully assemble in somebody else's fucking neighborhood."

In another video, a shiny blue truck blocks the road, and a woman announces that she has called the police on the protesters. One man says the protesters might break out windows, to which the protesters respond that they march every night, and that has never happened.

When Snohomish County Sheriff deputies arrived, around 8:30 p.m., few protesters remained, according to a statement from Sheriff Adam Fortney.

Chief Best issued a statement Monday, in a letter to Seattle City Council President Lorena Gonzalez and safety chair Lisa Herbold. This letter angered Everyday March organizers, who said Chief Best mischaracterized their peaceful protests as violent agitation.

"A residence of mine in Snohomish County was targeted by a large group of aggressive protesters late last night," Best wrote. "My neighbors were concerned by such a large group, but they were successful in ensuring the crowd was not able to trespass or engage in other illegal behavior in the area, despite repeated attempts to do so."

Best asked the Seattle council members to "stand up for what is right," and called for an end to these visits to city leaders' homes, before things "devolve into the new way of doing business by mob rule." Gonzalez and Herbold have met with the Everyday Marchers at their homes.

Best posted the letter to the Seattle Police Department's news blog, despite this incident not happening in Seattle.

A Seattle Police Department spokesperson would not provide details to support Chief Best's claim that these protesters had attempted to commit "illegal acts."

Chief Best said the protesters' actions against elected officials were "out of line with and go against every democratic principle that guides our nation."

Tealshawn Turner, who goes by TK, is one organizer of the frequent marches and was there on Saturday in Snohomish.

"The Black community put Chief Best in that office she's in right now ... we stepped up and stood up for her," Turner said in an Instagram video. "To see her response to what her neighbors did to us, is quite mortifying."

Turner said that if Chief Best wanted to defend the people in that Snohomish neighborhood, and not the protesters from Seattle, she should take up employment there.

The encounter highlights a rift between the values of those who live in rural Washington state, where Chief Best lives, and those who reside in the area she serves.

"They were dressed in black, pretty much with bandanas and stuff," said Susan Kelley, one of Best's neighbors. "They wouldn't fit in with the kids around here."

The neighbors said the protesters did not step onto their property, remaining in the road.

One neighbor, who drove a vehicle into the roadway to stop the line of cars, said the protesters appeared organized. "Their cars were numbered," the neighbor said, asking not to be named. "They had walkie-talkies."

These were safety measures. They had already lost one of their own, 24-year-old Summer Taylor, when a man drove his car through the marchers who had occupied Interstate 5 on July 4. They keep marchers safe by surrounding them with cars.

Another neighbor, a mom of 10 who lives on Chief Best's street, said the cars concerned her.

"I looked down the line of cars, and I saw a megaphone ... and that's when it clicked, and I knew who they were coming for," she said. She asked not to be named. "I knew they were up to no good."

She continued: "I knew exactly what was going on. It's all over the news. It's happening everywhere. And it's the reason that it's happening is because nobody's standing up to it."

The woman said the protesters didn't proceed past her house, which is four and a half Seattle city blocks from Chief Best's home.

"The agenda is not to just defund the police," the woman's husband said. "I believe that the

agenda just keeps going and going until America is you know, diminished and compromised."

On Tuesday evening, the Everyday March traveled to councilmember Debora Juarez's home in Victory Heights, in north Seattle.

They came with a brass band, and the sounds of clarinet, drums and saxophone drew out neighbors. The marchers chanted Juarez's phone number and greeted neighbors with a flier of their five demands.

Their demands are: Defund Seattle Police by at least 50 percent; invest money into Black communities; amnesty for protestors; no new youth jail now, not in five years; and that Seattle Mayor Jenny Durkan should resign.

"Let your neighbor know that Black Lives and the demands matter to YOU! Your representative MUST be expected to do exactly that: represent you," reads the mint green

flier.

Juarez didn't come outside that night. Her daughter did, however, standing on the lawn, a "Black Lives Matter" sweater tied around her waist. The Everyday Marchers said, chanting, they would be back, because their earlier attempts to reach Juarez hadn't worked.

Before they departed for the night, after marching for four hours and with plans to gather and march again the next day, Turner explained the importance of showing up, everyday.

- In the early morning of August 3, the Lynnwood Times reached out to all Snohomish County Councilmembers and the Mayor of Seattle to provide statements. Their statements will be posted in the order received.

Roughly 40 vehicles lined the road of a small, quiet, and quaint residential community in unincorporated Snohomish County to protest at the private residence of Seattle Police Chief Carmen Best. According to the Snohomish County Sheriff's Office, this is the first occurrence of protestors targeting an official in the county. The incident took place at 6:50 p.m. on Saturday, August 1.

Firsthand witnesses told the Lynnwood Times that a neighbor tipped off residents to dozens of vehicles traversing the street of the private residence of Best. Neighbors aware of Best's physical home location, established a perimeter to protect her home from possible mischief. Best was not home at the time of the incident.

A crowd of about 200 persons, mostly white men and women in their twenties, were dressed in black with masks and black hoods and carried signs that read "Black Lives Matter." Black Lives Matter protestors shouted profanity and insults at neighbors, took license plate information on vehicles, took pictures of homes, and asked little kids who lived in the neighborhood what schools they attended.

Other BLM protesters carrying large duffle bags attempted to make their way to Chief Best's private residence. When confronted by neighbors to show the content of the large duffle bags, protesters refused to cooperate. There were no reports of any physical altercations.

In a statement to the Lynnwood Times, Snohomish County Sheriff Adam Fortney wrote, "I assured her [Best] that the Snohomish County Sheriff's Office would deploy whatever resources were necessary to protect her, her family, and her property."

Neighbors told the Lynnwood Times that some of their private information has been publicly disclosed on social media and they are afraid for their safety. Because of this, the Lynnwood Times is respecting the confidentiality of those that provided statements and not disclosing the home address of Chief Best.

Because of the proactive response by neighbors, the crowd dispersed by 7:45 p.m. that evening. Neighbors shared that a yellow GMC Vandura van and a motorcycle was seen several times throughout the evening driving through the neighborhood.

"I feel incredibly unsafe," said one neighbor. "We think it will happen again... Their objective was not completed; they never made it to her house, we stopped them... so we think they will be back."

All of the neighbors interviewed by the Lynnwood Times were thankful to the Snohomish County Sheriff's Office for providing an around the clock law enforcement presence.

In his statement Sheriff Fortney wrote, "The Snohomish County Sheriff's Office has been supportive and accommodating to all peaceful protests that have occurred in our jurisdiction. With that said, protestors targeting one individual's house is a bullying tactic that will certainly require an extra patrol response to ensure every resident in Snohomish County can feel safe in their own home, with their loved ones, no matter what they choose to do to make a living."

A community resident and witness to the protest shared some of the tactics used by BLM protestors.

"They were very organized. They had radios, talking to each other. They had numbers they used to decal all their cars for who knows what. So, they were identifying all their vehicles individually by number. They came with a mission...They were out here intimidating us."

Many of the residents have lived in the neighborhood for well over ten years.

"It is an awesome neighborhood. It is quiet and we know most of the neighbors. There are a lot of families with kids who ride their bikes and play with their skateboards."

Chief Best personally thanked each of her neighbors for their support and apologized to them for the incident. However, neighbors responded with sympathy to Best for the ordeal she and her staff are going through.

"She [Best] thanked us all for banding together," one neighbor told the Lynnwood Times. "It made us feel awesome. She felt she had to apologize to all of us, that this was happening to us and we said no. We apologized to her that this is happening to her."

When asked to comment on the incident, one neighbor said, "At the end of the day, the biggest thing we aren't getting anymore is discourse. As a country, as a nation, as a people, we had always done a good job, whether or not you are right, left or indifferent. When things came about there was conversation...a meeting of minds...people talked."

He continued, "At the end of the day, whether or not the protest would have been peaceful all day long is the fact that there is one bad apple...could that one bad apple light a house on fire or do something destructive."

Statements from elected officials

Best was appointed Seattle Police Chief by Seattle Mayor Jenny Durkan on August 13, 2018. Best, a native of Tacoma, Washington, became the first African American woman to serve as Seattle's chief of police and one of a handful of female African American police chiefs in the United States.

Snohomish Mayor John Kartak

Snohomish Mayor John Kartak shared with the Lynnwood Times his concern to the recent trend to dox and protest at the private residents of both elected and law enforcement officials.

"Although this took place outside city limits, it is well within my Snohomish community. As the Mayor of Snohomish, I find this deeply troubling... I condemn the doxing tactics used against fellow officials and law enforcement. I have never doxed anyone and I have never supported doxing anyone."

Doxing is the practice of publishing private or identifying information about an individual on the internet, typically with malicious intent. According to the New York Post article, "Personal information of high-ranking cops leaked online, feds say," law enforcement officials had their personal information posted online amid nationwide unrest over the police killing of George Floyd.

Kartak continued, "We are in times when a few voices are loudly crying out to defund our police. I would like to challenge every citizen and every voter to consider that they need to decide what they value. I know my community values their police and their sheriffs."

The Lynnwood Times reached out to former Snohomish County Sheriff and current 44th Legislative District Representative John Lovick for comment about the incident and tactics used by the BLM protesters, but he did not return any of our calls.

Seattle Mayor Jenny Durkan

Kelsey Nyland, provided the following statement to the Lynnwood Times on behalf of Seattle Mayor Jenny Durkan:

"There is no one better positioned to transform the Seattle Police Department than Chief Best. She has nearly 30 years in the department, and she knows it better than anyone."

"Peaceful protests push elected officials and governments to be better. They are a core tenet of our democracy, and the City remains committed to supporting our communities' right to peacefully protest. But we cannot keep engaging in hateful language and destruction. Those acts undermine the push for systemic change, and they are unsustainable. In order to truly make the change communities are asking for, we must be in conversation and in partnership with each other."

Nyland shared with the Lynnwood Times that Mayor Durkan has had five demonstrations at her house in recent weeks. As U.S. Attorney, Mayor Durkan has prosecuted cartels, Russian cybercrimes (a son of a oligarch), and right wing militias.

Durkan and her family are part of the 4,500 people statewide who are part of a state program for individuals who have been targets of stalking and domestic violence.

There are several forms in which civil discussion around policy can occur in our society, including public meetings, emails, and peaceful demonstrations in the public square. Harassing the Seattle Police Chief at her personal home is completely unacceptable and these sorts of intimidation tactics require strong condemnation. I call on Seattle's elected leaders to join me in denouncing this inappropriate behavior."

Current local trends by BLM to intimidate elected officials

Seattle Police Chief Best is the latest official to have been targeted by BLM groups. In June, 50 BLM supporters vandalized the home of Olympia Mayor Cheryl Selby. Joined by Seattle City Councilmember Kshama Sawant, hundreds of BLM protestors demonstrated in front of the home of Seattle Mayor Jenny Durkan.

Only two weeks ago, protestors marched at the homes of Seattle councilmembers Alex Pedersen and Debora Juarez demanding their vote to defund the Seattle police department.

On Friday, July 31, Seattle City Council members offered a proposal to cut 100 full-time officers from the department's budget and create alternative systems to prevent violence and provide community safety.

The latest Crosscut-Elway scientific poll of 402 registered voters in WA conducted July 11-15, found that majority of Washingtonians oppose defunding law enforcement agencies. When asked about changing the current policing model, 62% of those surveyed oppose dismantling and starting over with a new model and 73% oppose reducing law enforcement funding by 50%.

The Crosscut-Elway Poll is a quarterly survey of voters in Washington state. It has been providing an independent nonpartisan analysis of public opinion trends in Washington and the Northwest since 1975.

Protesters smashed glass and set fires across Capitol Hill Wednesday night in a bout of mayhem organizers said was a "call for direct action" against Seattle Police and federal agents.

The night's early targets included the E Olive Way Starbucks and the soon to open new Uncle Ike's nearby where fireworks were reportedly used to start a small fire on the outside of the building that was quickly extinguished by Seattle Fire as the protesters marched on. The Uncle Ike's at 23rd and Union was also damaged by a suspected arson fire involving fireworks in early July.

Starbucks continues to be a target in Seattle protests over its support of the Seattle Police Foundation.

The Blu Dot showroom and the Neko cat cafe also suffered damage during the riot involving around 100 people who marched from Cal Anderson starting around 10 PM. UPDATE: Sounds like the report of damage to Neko wasn't as bad as it could have been. Ownership reports the building was hit with graffiti. Thanks for checking on the kitties. E Pine's Plant Shop also suffered a broken window.

Seattle Police were present in large numbers following the crowd and collecting evidence at crime and fire scenes.

As the demonstrators marched near the East Precinct later in the night, protesters ripped down plywood and busted into the Rove vintage store and were reported gathering clothing and items from inside and setting the goods on fire.



Seattle Police Open Investigation After Officer Appeared To Mace A Young Girl During George Floyd Protests

CORRECTION 5:30pm ET June 2, 2020: An earlier version of this article said the officer identified on the scene was the one who pepper sprayed the little girl but Seattle Police have concluded he was not the officer who did so. We edited accordingly and swapped out the featured image to reflect this change.

What began as non-violent protests sweeping across the nation after Minneapolis police were implicated in the death of George Floyd—an unarmed Black man who yelled he couldn't breathe as an officer knelt on his neck for almost ten minutes while two other officers held him down-turned violent in cities around the country.

Over the weekend, outraged people took to the streets holding signs and chanting a variety of slogans to speak out citing years of systemic racism and racial bias in law enforcement and the justice system. The protests led to clashes with police and National Guard personnel in several states.

One incident involved a young girl in Seattle filmed crying after an officer allegedly pepper-sprayed her in the face as police descended upon protestors.

Buzzfeed News said that the Seattle Police Department would not confirm the identity of the officer who maced the child, but an investigation into the incident concluded that the officer initially identified as the one who maced the child did not in fact do so.

Kelsey Nyland of the police department's Joint Information Center said:

"Uses of force, including pepper spray, during the demonstrations will undergo a high level of scrutiny and review by the chain of command."

"This incident in particular has been referred to the [Office of Police Accountability] and an investigation has commenced."

That investigation concluded that the officer initially identified as the one who deployed pepper spray did not in fact do so.

The actual moment where she was maced was not captured on camera, but video shows a parent trying to comfort her as she cries.

Nearby protesters are seen spritzing her with water and drenching her face in milk—which is known to be a soothing agent to the affected area but does not remove the oil—as she continues to shriek from the pain. Some posts of the video include the name of a Seattle police officer, but department officials say he is not the one who maced the little girl.

Twitter user, Julián Torres, told the news outlet he transferred the video onto his computer before it was removed.

"After I got it on my laptop, I refreshed ... and the video for sure was already taken down within the first 5 minutes."


"Some people said that they took it down because it showed the little girl's face."

The original footage was shot by Evan Hreha and was shared by 28-year-old Seattle native, Kayvon Behroozian—who was not at the protest.

Hreha said that the protest was initially peaceful before the pepper spraying incident.

"I was walking around and observing — everyone was peaceful. There was some heckling at the cops but that was to be expected."

Hreha said the thing that made him hit the record button was when he witnessed law enforcement "pushing a sign."



"They had been maced and that's when I started filming. Everybody on the left side of the street were all saying that it was officer Campbell [who maced]."

Hreha approached an officer whose badge number was covered but identified him as "J. Campbell"-the person the crowd initially accused of spraying the girl.

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Seattle Police Open Investigation After Officer Appeared To Mace A Young Girl During George Floyd Protests

CORRECTION 5:30pm ET June 2, 2020: An earlier version of this article said the officer identified on the scene was the one who pepper sprayed the little girl but Seattle Police have concluded he was not the officer who did so. We edited accordingly and swapped out the featured image to reflect this change.

What began as non-violent protests sweeping across the nation after Minneapolis police were implicated in the death of George Floyd—an unarmed Black man who yelled he couldn't breathe as an officer knelt on his neck for almost ten minutes while two other officers held him down–turned violent in cities around the country.

Over the weekend, outraged people took to the streets holding signs and chanting a variety of slogans to speak out citing years of systemic racism and racial bias in law enforcement and the justice system. The protests led to clashes with police and National Guard personnel in several states.

One incident involved a young girl in Seattle filmed crying after an officer allegedly pepper-sprayed her in the face as police descended upon protestors.

Buzzfeed News said that the Seattle Police Department would not confirm the identity of the officer who maced the child, but an investigation into the incident concluded that the officer initially identified as the one who maced the child did not in fact do so.

Kelsey Nyland of the police department's Joint Information Center said:

"Uses of force, including pepper spray, during the demonstrations will undergo a high level of scrutiny and review by the chain of command."

"This incident in particular has been referred to the [Office of Police Accountability] and an investigation has commenced."

That investigation concluded that the officer initially identified as the one who deployed pepper spray did not in fact do so.

The actual moment where she was maced was not captured on camera, but video shows a parent trying to comfort her as she cries.

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Nearby protesters are seen spritzing her with water and drenching her face in milk—which is known to be a soothing agent to the affected area but does not remove the oil—as she continues to shriek from the pain. Some posts of the video include the name of a Seattle police officer, but department officials say he is not the one who maced the little girl.

Twitter user, Julián Torres, told the news outlet he transferred the video onto his computer before it was removed.

"After I got it on my laptop, I refreshed ... and the video for sure was already taken down within the first 5 minutes."


"Some people said that they took it down because it showed the little girl's face."

The original footage was shot by Evan Hreha and was shared by 28-year-old Seattle native, Kayvon Behroozian—who was not at the protest.

Hreha said that the protest was initially peaceful before the pepper spraying incident.

"I was walking around and observing — everyone was peaceful. There was some heckling at the cops but that was to be expected."

Hreha said the thing that made him hit the record button was when he witnessed law enforcement "pushing a sign."



"They had been maced and that's when I started filming. Everybody on the left side of the street were all saying that it was officer Campbell [who maced]."

Hreha approached an officer whose badge number was covered but identified him as "J. Campbell"-the person the crowd initially accused of spraying the girl.

However, the department said Campbell was not the culprit.

According to The Stranger, Seattle City Council member Lisa Herbold stated:

"The officer that was identified as the perpetrator is not the individual who dispersed the pepper spray."

"The officer previously identified... did not actually deploy pepper spray, according to the Seattle Office of Police Accountability (OPA)."

Herbold added:

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"But they have been investigating the proper person, the officer who deployed the pepper spray on Saturday."







Jameela Jamil slams officer Jared Campbell who maced a 9-year-old girl: 'Did she scare you in your riot gear?'


'Please wear your protective gear at the protests today. The last thing those fighting for freedom need on top of their grief and anguish is fu*king Covid-19,' she said



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

Introduction

I am a tenured associate professor at the University of Texas at Austin, where I teach courses on surveillance, data privacy and media law for the Moody College of Communication. In addition, I hold a courtesy faculty appointment at the University of Texas at Austin School of Law. For nearly two decades, my scholarly research has focused on the regulation of free expression that occurs in an online environment. I am a member of the Florida Bar Association and an inactive member of the Missouri Bar Association. Prior to joining the academy, I prosecuted domestic violence and other misdemeanor cases for the St. Charles County Prosecuting Attorney's Office under Missouri Supreme Court Rule 13.

Based on my professional and academic career, I was asked to provide my expertise regarding online incivility in the United States. In particular, I was asked to provide my expertise as to the likely consequences of the public disclosure of the police officers' identities.

My preliminary conclusions are¹:

- Disclosing the Police Officers' Names Would Likely Subject Them and/or Their Families to Harassment, Shaming and Physical Threats
- II. Disclosing the Police Officers' Names Would Have a Chilling Effect on Their First Amendment Right to Freedom of Expression

Background

I joined the faculty of the University of Texas at Austin in January 2019 as a tenured associate professor in the Moody College of Communication. In September 2021, I was awarded a courtesy appointment in the University of Texas at Austin School of Law. I served as an associate professor in residence at Northwestern University's campus in Qatar from

August 2014 to December 2019. Prior to my international appointment, I earned tenure and promotion to associate professor status at the University of Minnesota's School of Journalism and Mass Communication in 2013. I also maintained affiliate faculty status with the University of Minnesota Law School from 2009 to 2014. my relevant teaching experience includes both undergraduate and graduate level courses in media law & ethics, introduction to mass communication, law of Internet speech and mass communication law research. These courses cover myriad topics, including the First Amendment, anonymous speech, surveillance, online incivility, data privacy and protection, doxing, access to information and speech-related torts.

My scholarly research focuses on legal responses to technological changes in mass communication and their relation to freedom of speech issues. I am the author of more than two dozen scholarly journal articles, seven book chapters, an encyclopedia article and a wellknown law school casebook, *The First Amendment and the Fourth Estate: The Law of Mass Media* (13th ed. Foundation Press). I regularly speak to civic and industry groups on legal topics related to data privacy, social media and freedom of expression. I am also a regular presenter and attendee at numerous national and international professional and academic conferences, including the American Bar Association Forum on Communication Law, Practising Law Institute's Communication Law in the Digital Age, the Association for Education in Journalism and Mass Communication, International Association of Mass Communication Research and the Law & Society Association. I recently became the first female editor of *Communication Law and Policy*, one of the leading peer-reviewed academic journals in my field.

I earned a Ph.D. in Mass Communication with an emphasis in First Amendment Law from the University of Florida College of Journalism and Communications. My dissertation was one of the first studies of how courts were applying pre-Internet jurisprudence to

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defamation cases arising in the online space. I earned my Juris Doctorate and Master of Arts degree in Professional Journalism from the University of Iowa. I hold a Bachelor of Arts degree in Communication: Journalism and a Bachelor of Science degree in Justice Systems from Truman State University in Kirksville, Mo.

In preparation of this report, I reviewed these case-related materials:

- Mainstream news coverage of the events of January 6, 2021 and subsequent events from Reuters, CNN, US News and World Report
- Mainstream news coverage of police/public interactions in the aftermath of the George Floyd killing
- Research reports from Pew Research Center related on online threats
- Research reports from the City of Seattle and Fraternal Order of Police
- Independently gathered social media posts about the events of January 6, 2021
- Independently gathered "anti-police" social media posts

Expert Analysis

The introduction of the Internet as a mass communication technology has <u>increased</u> citizens' ability to engage in free expression on a variety of issues by reducing the influence of the institutional press and allowing alternative voices to robustly engage in the gathering

and dissemination of information—including political speech. But it has also emboldened anonymous speakers and others who use the Internet and social media platforms to harass or otherwise threaten those they disagree with—and they do so in ways that can now reach sizable audiences. A <u>2021 study</u> by the Pew Research Center found that internet incivility affects more than 40 percent of U.S. adults, and it has been increasing in severity in recent years. As they <u>note</u>, the number of adults who have "experienced more severe forms of harassment – such as physical threats, stalking, sexual harassment or sustained harassment – or multiple forms of harassing behaviors online have both risen substantially in the past three years." The number of respondents saying they have received physical threats has <u>doubled</u> since 2014. Further, according to the research, men are more likely than women to experience physical threats. Not surprisingly, political views play a central role in online incivility. The study found that "[f]ully 20% of all adults – or 50% of online harassment targets – say they have been harassed online because of their political views."

In the aftermath of the events of January 6, 2021, a number of individuals and organized groups—including the D.C. Police Department and the Federal Bureau of Investigation—attempted to "crowdsource" the identity of people in various photos and videos that appeared to have been taken throughout Washington, D.C. on that day. As Reuters **reported**, "The FBI also asked the public to help it identify rioters, a call that drew ribbing on social media in light of the prolific coverage of the event. This included selfies posted by participants and videos <u>here</u> of President Donald Trump's supporters at area hotels before the attack." Entire <u>threads</u> on social media emerged with people attempting to "name and shame" those captured in various photos and videos. HuffPost <u>reported</u> extensively on these efforts, which have been embraced by some law enforcement agencies: "Often operating under the <u>"Sedition Hunters" moniker</u>, they've archived more than 2,000 Facebook accounts, over 1,125 YouTube channels, 500-plus Instagram accounts, nearly

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1,000 Twitter feeds, more than 100 Rumble profiles and over 250 TikTok accounts. They've gathered more than 4.1 terabytes — 4,100 gigabytes — of data, enough to fill dozens of new iPhones with standard-issue storage."

In the days that followed, the news reported multiple accounts of people who had been identified and subsequently fired from their jobs, including people <u>who had not</u> <u>entered the Capitol</u>. Business owners who were in D.C. to attend President Trump's speech were also <u>targeted</u>. "In <u>Louisiana</u>, customers said they would boycott supermarket chain Rouses Market after retired owner Donald Rouse was shown in a photo at Wednesday's riot. Rouse said in an email statement that he attended the rally as a supporter of the president but left before the violence began."

Even those who simply voiced support—but weren't physically present in D.C. have faced repercussions. As CNN <u>reported</u>, "Americans in positions of power are also being disciplined for their support of the violence, even if they weren't at the Capitol. The Texas Republican Party removed Walter West, its sergeant-at-arms, from his position after West made comments on Facebook supporting the Capitol siege." <u>News accounts</u> named <u>law</u> <u>enforcement</u> and military members who had been identified, investigated, and even charged, based their support of illegal conduct that took place on January 6.

Public opinion around policing in the United States has made frequent headlines since police in Ferguson fatally shot Michael Brown in 2014. A 2020 <u>study</u> by the Pew Research Center, which was conducted in the month following George Floyd's death in police custody, found declining support for police with regard to numerous factors, including protecting people from crime, using the right amount of force, treating people equally and holding officers accountable for misconduct. In fact, more than one-third of respondents graded police performance as poor (the lowest ranking) with regard to using the right amount of force, treating people equally and holding officers accountable for misconduct.

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A recent <u>search of Change.org</u>, an online website that allows individuals to start petitions and gather signatures, revealed dozens of petitions aimed at getting police officers in the United States terminated from their jobs, defunding the police or demanding police not be allowed in schools. Several petitions naming individual officers had more than 20,000 signatures. In particular, the first result that appeared in my search involved Seattle police officer Jared Campbell, who was wrongly named as an officer who used pepper spray on a child during a protest. Despite being cleared of any wrongdoing, Officer Campbell was still named in a <u>petition</u> calling for his termination that garnered more than 45,000 signatures. In his Declaration, Officer Campbell says that the petition, along with threats and online harassment that included the posting of his home address, caused him to leave the Seattle Police Department and move his family away from the Seattle area.

Throughout the Pacific Northwest, and in Seattle in particular, policing has been a hot-button issue in the past 18 months. Nonprofit news website Crosscut has <u>called</u> public safety "one of the most polarizing issues in the city." The Associated Press <u>reported</u> in August 2021 that more than 200 Seattle police officers had quit their jobs in the past year, leaving a police force with just over 1,000 officers. According to <u>results</u> from the 2020 Public Safety Survey, only 53% of respondents had a positive view of policing in Seattle.

All of these events are occurring at a time when online threats against police and even ambushes of officers—many fatal—have been <u>increasing</u>. The Fraternal Order of Police released a report noting that ambush-style attacks on police were up 115% from 2020. According to <u>their figures</u>, 130 officers had been shot in 103 separate ambush attacks that year; 30 were killed.

Doxxing police officers is another common tactic. Doxing is the online release of personal information, such as home addresses, home phone numbers, spouse's names, children's names, names of children's schools, spouse's place of employments. In July 2020, the Department of Homeland Security <u>revealed</u> that 38 officers in Portland, Oregon, had been doxxed amid ongoing protests. This occurred despite the Portland Police Department's effort to shield the officers' names, by authorizing officers to cover their names with tape when working protests. In an interview with a Buffalo, New York, television station, Captain Jeff Rinaldo revealed that a number of Buffalo police officers had been doxed. He was <u>**quoted**</u> saying, "Many of the websites contain information threatening their children and families. There are things being said that I can't talk about in a public TV broadcast. That's how vile some of this is. It's absolutely disgusting the steps that some people have taken to harass police officers for doing their jobs."

These accounts of how police officers have been treated follow a similar pattern of conduct that several Seattle police officers have described in their declarations. In many instances, these incidents involve threats to, or about, an officer's spouse and/or children. Officer McNew's Declaration describes how people used his name to locate and target his wife and her business. As a result, his wife was harassed and threatened, her business was vandalized and her merchandise was destroyed. Similarly, Officer Auderer's declaration includes threats about sexually assaulting his teenage daughter and killing his father. Both threats used his family members' full names. Other threats included the use of his home address or his daughter's school.

Declarations from Seattle police officers demonstrate the breadth of the problem in their area. As the head of the police union, Officer Solan attests to numerous instances in which police officers' private information has been shared or they have been threatened. In his Declaration, Officer Maehler attests that members of the public had located his wife's name and their home address. He documented threats to his family and their home. He has been asked about his wife's employment at a teacher, with the person making reference to the specific school where she worked and threatening to assault her while she was at school. He

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has received calls on his personal cell phone identifying him by name and threatening to kill him and his family.

The problem of doxxing has become so serious that some states have passed laws to prevent police officers' information from being posted publicly. In 2021, Oklahoma Gov. Kevin Stitt <u>signed</u> HB 1643 (the Police Doxxing Law) into law, and it took effect on November 1. Minnesota <u>passed</u> a similar law in 2021. Although there is concern about whether these laws are constitutional, prosecutors have suggested they could prosecute people who post the information, photos or videos with a clear intent to intimidate or harass. As one Oklahoma prosecutor noted, "There is no doubt that law enforcement officials are no different than other citizens when it comes to being victimized."

The Critical Factors I Used to Form My Conclusion as to the Probability of Hatred, Ridicule, Threats, Harassment or Reprisal

- Factor 1: Seattle's political climate is dominated by progressive views that differ from the officers' views.
- Factor 2: The history of considerable anti-police sentiment in both Seattle and the broader United States.
- Factor 3: The vitriol that has been directed toward attendees of President Donald Trump's January 6, 2021, speech in Washington, D.C.
- Factor 4: The tactics used to harass those who attended the January 6 speech are easily discernable and can be replicated by the average citizen who has little technological sophistication.
- Factor 5: Police officers in both Seattle and the broader United States have been the subject of doxxing and online harassment in numerous other instances, which is a common tactic among those who publicly express their "anti-police" sentiment.

- Factor 6: The sole purpose of this litigation, as it has been explained to me, is to obtain these officers' identities.
- Factor 7: Given the characteristics of the internet speech environment, speech on social media and other platforms is often hyperbolic and obscures facts, which has led these officers to be referred to as 'white supremacists' and has resulted in officers being wrongfully accused of misconduct. As a result, it is likely the truth may never surface in many of these instances.²
- Factor 8: The high-profile nature of this case, and its coverage in major mainstream news outlets, almost ensures their names will be broadcast to a mass audience, including people far from Seattle.

With a reasonable degree of academic and professional certainty and on a more probable than not basis, I believe these officers and their families will be subjected to hatred and ridicule in the community, threats online or harassments and reprisals. I further offer the following conclusions:

Conclusion: Disclosing the Police Officers' Names Would Likely Subject Them and

Their Families to Harassment, Shaming and Physical Threats

Given the rise of online incivility—particularly with regard to physical threats and other serious harassment involving significant doxxing campaigns against police officers and the animus toward Donald Trump and the political divisions that exist in the United States today, common sense alone would suggest that disclosure of the names of Seattle police officers who supported Donald Trump or attended his January 6 speech would result in

² Back in 1974, U.S. Supreme Court Justice Lewis Powell indicated this in his opinion for the Court in *Gertz v. Welch*, 413 U.S. 323, where he wrote in Footnote 9: "Of course, an opportunity for rebuttal seldom suffices to undo harm of defamatory falsehood. Indeed, the law of defamation is rooted in our experience that the truth rarely catches up with a lie."

their harassment and shaming. Careful study of the social media climate in the days following the events of January 6, 2021, reveals a large-scale effort to "name and shame" on the part of some users who were attempting to identify people present in various photos and videos from Washington, D.C. Added to this, the rise in anti-police sentiment, including ambush attacks on police, and the particularly challenging relationship between the police and public in Seattle, which includes previous threats against officers and their families, lead me to conclude there is a reasonable probability that these officers and/or their families would be subjected to hatred and ridicule in the community, threats online or harassments and reprisals.

Conclusion: Disclosing the Police Officers' Names Would Have a Chilling Effect on Their First Amendment Rights to Freedom of Expression

As the Office of Police Accountability investigation report notes, "The First Amendment is perhaps the most fundament right enshrined in the U.S. Constitution. ... The First Amendment does not just protect speech or view that are popular or that are held by a majority of a given community, it also ensures that alternative views, even where abhorrent or faculty incorrect, are shielded from government restraint or retaliation."

Given the backlash against the events of January 6, 2021—which have impacted even those who did not illegally enter the U.S. Capitol—the rise in "anti-police" sentiment and the increasing severity of online threats, common sense alone would suggest that Seattle police officers who supported Donald Trump or attended his January 6 speech would be less inclined to publicly share their political views. Careful study of the social media climate in the days following the events of January 6, 2021, lead me to conclude there is a reasonable probability that the compelled disclosure of these officers' personal information would subject them and their families to threats, harassment, or reprisals that would discourage them from further political participation. A well-known theory called Spiral of Silence, which is

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routinely used in the study of human communication and public opinion, suggests that "the perception that one's opinion is unpopular tends to inhibit or discourage one's expression of it." As a result, were these police officers to be named publicly, it would almost certainly result in a chilling effect on their First Amendment rights to freedom of expression by discouraging them from publicly voicing unpopular political views in the future.
